Modern Madras Table Runner is the best project for new ombre enthusiasts because it just uses 3 Ombre SKY fabrics per side. It's a reversible table runner that is easy to make due to simple piecing and comes together quickly. Students get to focus more on the



color and less on construction. Bonus learning golden nugget is that Jennifer teaches in depth how to matchstick quilt which gives this textile fabulous texture. And it's great as a piece on the back of a couch or bottom of the bed. Not just a table runner! Students consistently give this class a **Five Star** review. You can use your own ombre fabrics or purchase Jennifer's ombre fabrics or a class kit on her website. It is suggested that you purchase her book that contains the pattern but <u>it is not mandatory</u>. A discount code and supply list will be provided when you sign up for this fun workshop. Jennifer will be at Asilomar in May 2023!

Member Profile: Phyllis Obley and Joann Dunbar

Peninsula Quilters Guild has its own mother-daughter quilting team. **Phyllis Obley**, whom many call "mom," and **Joann Dunbar** quilt together, attend quilt classes and retreats

together, participate in a guild activities together, and since the early 2000s live together. When asked for this interview, they both said they had nothing to say but during our conversation told a lot of stories and provided several chuckles.

Phyllis was born in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, and grew up in several other places there and in nearby states because her father moved for his job as a bridge building engineer. When she was 20, she married and moved to San Francisco to be nearer her husband who was stationed in Hawaii while serving in WWII. After the war, they decided the area was a good place for them, first in San Francisco and then in San Mateo. They raised their two children, a boy and a girl. As of now, she has 13 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Joann Dunbar, her daughter, was born in San Francisco and remained in northern California all her life. She has three children, three stepchildren, and also



raised grandchildren and nieces. The numbers are hard to calculate. Many P.Q. members are most familiar with Tammy, a granddaughter, who used to come to meetings and class with her, and recently performed in the high school production of Cinderella.

Phyllis' entrance into the quilting world was a bit unusual. She had always loved dolls, so started making porcelain dolls, dressing them, displaying them. She has them on shelves and bookcases throughout the house and in her room. She still has many --some completed, some waiting to be strung, some needing wigs, some needing dressing. Wouldn't it be great to have a show for the guild? In the mid-'80s, she decided to branch out from doll making and make a stuffed bear for Joann. She saw one in Laurel Leaf and went in for the pattern. All the gorgeous material lured her into the quilting world and she made her first quilt.

Joann saw what her mother was doing and wanted to join in on the fun. They made a rag quilt with Bev Stookey and then saw the pattern for X's and O's quilt. Quilt classes, quilt camps, quilt retreats followed. They most like traditional quilts and Phyllis now makes mostly baby quilts. In addition to the quilts Phyllis has stacked in her room, they've made quilts for family and friends and for various charities including an orphanage in the Congo (pre-COVID). A pair of quite productive quilters!

The final note is that on May 1 this year Phyllis will celebrate her 99th birthday! Let's rejoice with her.

Though she didn't begin quilting until later, this show was where she decided making quilts was what she wanted to do. Jessica designs her own

patterns mixing techniques. She does all of the work from beginning to end herself. A former member of the Santa Clara guild, Jessica is very interested in our philanthropic efforts.

Sydney Fisher's father was a boy with three sisters who taught him to sew. Sydney's mother didn't sew. Her father taught her to sew! Sydney began quilting as an adult mainly making baby quilts for her friends' grandchildren. She was an engineer and product manager before retirement. She loves the geometric components of pieced quilts, especially log cabin and star quilts. Sydney heard about the guild at a baby shower and came to the birthday party meeting.
