Modern Madras Table Runner is the best project for new ombre enthusiasts because it just uses 3 Ombre SKY fabrics per side. It's a reversible table runner that is easy to make due to simple piecing and comes together quickly. Students get to focus more on the color and less on construction. Bonus learning golden nugget is that Jennifer teaches in depth how to matchstick quilt which gives this textile fabulous texture. And it's great as a piece on the back of a couch or bottom of the bed. Not

just a table runner! Students consistently give this class a **Five Star** review. You can use your own ombre fabrics or purchase Jennifer's ombre fabrics or a class kit on her website. It is suggested that you purchase her book that contains the pattern but <u>it is not mandatory</u>. A discount code and supply list will be provided when you sign up for this fun workshop. Jennifer will be at Asilomar in May 2023!

Peninsula Quilters Guild Board Meeting January 4, 2022

Attendees: Sandy Kelly, Jena Walter, Barb Hall, Sara Medina, Rose Wilson, Leonie Batkin, Justine Bernard, Anne Merics, Julie Curry, Suzanne Jeuck, Joyce Wheeler and Brenda Ziegler

The meeting was called to order at 10:04 a.m.

President (Sandy Kelly) asked for a motion to approve the December board meeting minutes. The motion was approved, seconded and passed. She expressed her gratitude for the generosity of the San Mateo Garden Center. They have been allowing us usage of their facility for extended timeframes for no or low cost. She mentioned that there would be a financial audit in February and that there are still openings for several volunteer positions. The open VP position involves some activities that can be split out. She is looking for leads for the new member event in April, the next nominating committee, and the awarding of Quilter of the Year. She pointed out that there are other volunteer positions open, for example the Opportunity Quilt, and party organization. Also, unfortunately due to an unexpected change, the Web Administrator position is still open. A survey is being generated to examine membership commitment and to encourage participation in volunteering at any level. Sandy also suggested

adding a Tips & Techniques page to the newsletter and will discuss viability with Kathy McGuffin.

Membership (Anne Merics) reported that we have 145 members. She and Sara Medina discussed donation information for tax accounting. Anne will send Sara the membership list, which also indicates donations received. Sara will generate the documentation and forward to the appropriate members.

Retreats (Barb Hall) reported that the next retreat will be sometime in May and that the Welcome Committee is going well.

Treasurer (Sara Medina) reported that we have a good amount of funds. She will send a breakdown of the fundraising incomes by project to Leonie Batkin. She requested that the party committee submit Holiday Party receipts. Sara received a stack of bookmarks advertising Road to California, which is Jan. 18-21. She also received two entry tickets. A blast will go out to see who might be going.

Correspondence (Rose Wilson) reviewed that she had contacted and received thanks from Lorraine Strong's family, Susan Garcia (for the passing of her husband), Grace Hardy (for her surgery) and Judy Ousterhout (who fell and will be in rehab for a few months).

Activities and Educational Events (Angie Merlone) said library cases had been reserved for the May show at the Redwood City Library. The cases are small so donations for display should be small. She'd like to show a variety of styles: challenges, contemporary, traditional. She'd like to have a PQ poster. Joyce Wheeler helped out with suggestions from when she managed the event in the past. Angie will send out a blast and/or mention this opportunity to educate the public about the guild at the next general meeting.

Fund Raising (Leonie Batkin) wants to include the fundraising open positions in the guild survey. There was discussion throughout the meeting of finding ways to encourage more participation from the general membership. Leonie noted that volunteers are needed for the 23-24 Opportunity Quilt creation and a possible auction. Carol Stapleton's beautiful quilt has proved that the OQ is a great fund raiser.

Programs Julie Curry mentioned that Wanda Lewis Dragon was asking for instruction on her duties regarding programs.

Outreach (Julie Curry) recently donated 15 twin quilts to LifeMoves. No baby quilts. **Virtual Events (Jena Walters)** reported that Connie Bowles has offered to walk around with Zoom on her phone during the General Meetings so that people on Zoom can see any quilts on display. Jena is working with Sandy on the surveys and mentioned including information to promote the guild.

Volunteering Discussion included explaining more about some of the positions to encourage participation and to consider one lead for some positions instead of a committee. It was also suggested that maybe there should be mentors for the volunteer positions so people might feel more comfortable about offering their help. One possibility is that we have a Volunteer Fair (like a Job Fair) during one of the General Meetings so people can learn about the options. It was also pointed out that there are many positive, fulfilling aspects of volunteering.

If no one volunteers to work on the New Member Tea at the January General Meeting, Barb, Sandy and Justine offered to help.

Sandy Kelly closed the meeting, with thanks to all, at 10:49 a.m.
