### **Meet PQ member Gwen Matteucci**

Each Peninsula Quilt Guild member adds a surprising and unique piece to our collective personality. Each responds when asked to agree to an interview that she is like everyone else, that she has nothing interesting to write about, and each one tells a story like no one else's.

Gwen Matteucci tells us her charming story reminiscent of the quiet stories we read as young women about the country girl who grows up to go work and live in the big city. In telling about it, she lets us feel her joy in every aspect of her life.

Gwen was born in Soledad, Calif., and lived on the family ranch next to the mission. She and her siblings went to the small school with a student body of 75, 9 in her 8<sup>th</sup>-grade graduation, played in the fields, went to the California Rodeo, and took the bus to high school in Gonzales. She remembers the days of playing in the fields and waving to the crop dusters flying overhead, and using well water from those very fields. Gwen remembers her childhood as happy with everything she needed, and if something unusual had to be found, there was always a trip to the big city -- Salinas.

After high school, Gwen ventured up to San Francisco, moved to a women's residence on Larkin and California, and attended Heald's Business School. Her roommate was a young woman from New York who introduced Gwen to the cultural advantages of living in the city. They went to plays, visited art museums and enjoyed the dance halls. She talks of her joy living in San Francisco. Hers were the days when San Francisco was always a picture of beauty. Streets had flower trucks, women were always dressed up with hat and gloves, men were in suits, and people acted as though just being in the City was a source of happiness.



Eventually, Gwen, her husband and son bought a house and moved to Daly City. Soon after, she began her 25 years working as a secretary in the Daly City School District. She completed her work years as the principal's secretary at the high school.

In retirement, Gwen began to learn something she had always admired -- quilting. Her mother had been a wonderful seamstress, making everything from baby clothes to elegant evening gowns, but she had never quilted. Gwen had always been fascinated by quilts, the colors, the fabric, the designs. She began by taking lessons from Joy Lily, who was an improvisational quilter rather than a traditional one. Gwen stayed with her, learned some, but moved onto traditional quilting, which she preferred. At the Senior Center, Gwen made some good friends and still goes there and experienced the gradual change in membership. She joined Peninsula Quilters a couple of years ago and is delighted with the lovely ladies she has met.

She enjoys finding new projects and says she continues to quilt at her own pace. She quilts because it is a joy and not a job.

## **Peninsula Quilters Board Meeting Sept. 3, 2025**

Attendees: Nancy Krosse, Karen Anderson, Carol Blitzer, Holly Colgan, Jean Dail, Barbara Hall, Harriet Hirsch, Sandy Kelly, Barbara Mattson, Michele Parry, Jena Walter, Cynthia Yin and Brenda Ziegler.

The meeting was called to order at 10:03 a.m.

**President (Nancy Krosse)** received a motion from Jean Dail and a second from Carol Blitzer to approve the August board meeting minutes. This was passed by those in attendance. She mentioned that this was her last board meeting as President. During the year, we got our budget back on track. She will be helping Judith Paul with the September Birthday Party and requested school-themed quilts to hang. Sue McCollum has given out 50 paint chips for the Challenge and entries will also be hung for the September general meeting.

**Fundraising (Sandy Kelly)** asked for assistance with the Zoom set-up for the September meeting since she will be out of town. Cynthia Yin volunteered. Sandy talked about how successful the auction had been and how she enjoyed being the auctioneer.

**Activities and Education (Holly Colgan)** asked committee members for summary descriptions of their committee(s) to be included in the new roster. This prompted a discussion on the roster. Michele Parry is hoping to distribute it at the October meeting. It will include the slate of new officers. Holly also did a write-up of one new member for the October newsletter.

**Vice President (Barbara Mattson)** sent the new board information to the newsletter. The position of VP is still open, but she has some possible candidates. Responsibilities include the New Member Tea, Quilter of the Year, and the Nominating Committee. It was suggested that these activities could be split up or we could consider a day and a night VP option. Also, Michele pointed out the VP does not necessarily need to be the next President although that has been done in the past. Jena Walter mentioned that some guilds have more than one VP but only one is a voting member. The Quilter of the Year will be announced at the next meeting.

**Treasurer (Jean Dail)** reported that there were minimal expenses for the auction and that we have healthy bank accounts. She submitted a proposed budget draft for committee leader feedback. Dues are coming in, and they should cover the operating expenses. Barb Hall pointed out that Alice's Love can be removed from the budget as that event has ended. Since Barb is taking Julie Curry's position as Outreach chair, she asked how to handle tariffs costs. It was suggested to add 10% to estimated costs to cover tariff expenses. As always, the board can

approve any increase over \$500 required over budgeted amounts but anything over that needs to be approved by the membership. Jean requested budget estimates to her by the September general meeting, and she should have the full budget for membership review at the October general meeting.

**Corresponding Secretary (Nancy Krosse for Terry Caselton)** sent a condolence card to Judith Paul. Harriet Hirsch informed us that Kathleen Rohr, known for her long-arm quilt work, passed away.

**Membership (Cynthia Yin)** estimated that we have 150 members. She has received 63 renewals, one new member and 6 Life Members. There was a discussion of how best to thank those who added a donation to their renewal. It was suggested that email would be the timeliest method to show our appreciation. Cynthia also talked about the Brightest Little Star program and mentioned that 30 kits were ordered.

**Parliamentarian (Michele Parry)** mentioned changes she will make to the Standing Rules prior to the next roster print run. She will delete the storage locker since it was closed this year. Also, she'll revise info on what financial data will be entered into the meeting minutes as they are printed in the public newsletter. Michele announced that Karen Anderson will take the Parliamentarian position.

**Retreat (Jena Walter)** said she will be taking the sign-ups for the next Zoom retreat.

**Outreach (Barb Hall)** advised that the next retreat will be October 10-12. Sign-ups should go to Jena Walter after the September general meeting. A PQBlast will go out. A Free Sew will be held directly after the September meeting. It will feature sewing The Brightest Star blankets and/or dolls as a charity event. Nancy Krosse requested that a future Free Sew emphasize the production of bowl cozies for sale at the Garden Center Open House next Spring. Due to the Retreat, Bee Charitable is cancelled for Oct. 10.

**Life Member (Sandy Kelly)** suggested two members for Life Memberships. We are allowed to have 10 Life Members and at this point we have only 6. The board approved her suggestions, and they will be announced at the October general meeting.

**Treasurer (Jean Dail)** started a discussion about membership cards. It was proposed not to include them with the roster but to print generic dated cards for those who use them. Holly Colgan and Cynthia Yin discussed the choice of black and white or color printed cards. These cards will be available at the Membership table. Jean also asked about adjusting the Standing Rules to reflect changes in workshop costs and if the affiliate fees have increased. Cynthia Yin confirmed that there is no plan to increase the affiliate fees. Jean also brought up the issue of signers for the bank accounts. Two signers are required. This is usually the President and the VP. Since we do not yet have a VP, it was decided that the signers would be Barbara Mattson as President and Nancy Krosse with a title change to her new position as Fund Raising Chair.

Nancy adjourned the meeting at 11:12 a.m.

## **PQ General Meeting Minutes September 17, 2025**

Nancy Krosse called the meeting to order at 9:32 a.m.

The meeting was held at the San Mateo Garden Center and offered on Zoom.

**President:** Nancy Krosse reminded us that this is her last meeting as President. It is also the 47<sup>th</sup> birthday for PQ and will be celebrated after the meeting. She welcomed one new member, Carol Pulliam. There was a motion by Gretchen Michaels to approve the August minutes, which was seconded and passed by those present.

**Treasurer:** Jean Dail reported healthy bank balances and the replacement of a budgeted loss with a profit. The recent auction was very successful.

**Speakers/Workshops:** Jess Millikan showed a sample of a pillow with a wreath made from the pattern that will be taught by Tina Curran in the October workshop. It uses lots of scraps. There are still openings for this class. The pattern for this workshop is \$12, but Tina gives a discount if you buy three or more patterns. She will also give the discount to Guild members if you buy the pattern (at full price) ahead of time but then purchase two (or more) patterns when she is here in October. Tina will also be the speaker at the October General Meeting. In November, we will have Heather Kojan speak via Zoom on "Quilt Remix: UFO's, Orphan Blocks and What Was I Thinking?!! Fresh Ideas for Stale Projects." December is our Holiday Party. In January, Polly Matsuoka will speak on "Turning Cloth into Wonder: My Art Quilting Journey" at the meeting and hold a workshop ("Birds With Character: A Choose Your Own Adventure in Collage Quilting") the next day. She teaches a collage process from a photo which includes creating a pattern. She will supply a pattern of a jay with grass in its mouth or a dancing finch. The collages can be realistic or artistic. In February, we will Honor Our Own with Gale Green, whose presentation is "I'm Just a Regula Quilta!" In March, Michele Trimble will speak ("Adventures in Improv") and hold a workshop the next day ("Improv Sunbursts"). April will be the Spring Challenge and New Member event. Cassandra Beaver will speak in May ("Aurifilosophy") and teach a workshop on paper piecing ("Raise the Roof"). In June, our affiliates will be invited to speak, and Wanda Lewis Dragon will teach a workshop making Goodness Bowls. In July, Karen Bolan will discuss collaborative quilting. Sign up for workshops online at [peninsulaquilters.org](http://peninsulaquilters.org) via PayPal or send a check payable to Peninsula Quilters to Jess. Do not make the check to her as the credit union will not take third-party checks. Jess also announced the next Free Table at her house on Sept. 27 between 9 and 11:30 a.m. She has fabric, a table, bins and table topper kits. She'll accept donations until Sept. 24.

**Program Chair:** Nancy Krosse thanked all the auction volunteers on Sandy Kelly's behalf as she was not able to be at the meeting. Also, a big thank you goes to Sandy for her auctioneering talents.

**Corresponding Secretary:** A get-well card was sent to Joanne Dunbar.

**Outreach:** Julie Curry announced that this fiscal year, not including September, 127 baby quilts were donated, as well as 104 quilts to LifeMoves and 47 quilts to the Foster Kids program.

**Membership:** Cynthia Yin said 74 people have already submitted their dues. We have two new members. There were 71 people in attendance and five on Zoom. Dues can be paid by check at the meeting or online via PayPal.

**Parliamentarian:** Michele Parry will be updating the roster. She spoke about two items in the Standing Rules that need to be updated: removal of the mention of a storage unit since it was closed and that no financial information should be published for security reasons. Also, in the Bylaws, removal of the information on membership cards being provided with the rosters. They can be provided by request. Jess Millikan made a motion to approve all three changes, it was seconded by Carol Blitzer and approved by those present. Also, the membership thanked Michele for all her work.

**Outreach:** Barb Hall informed us that the Retreat will be Oct. 10-12 on Zoom. Sign up with Jena Walter. Barb has four kits ready for longarm work. We will have an Open Sew after this meeting.

**Holiday Party:** Cathy Stillman said several activities we had last year will be continuing, for example a pattern and book exchange, Bingo and gift basket prizes. She is looking for eight volunteers to decorate tables.

The Birthday Party, organized by Judith Paul, will have a Back-to-School theme.

**Vice President:** Barbara Mattson listed board members put forward by the Nominating Committee. Past President & Fund Raising: Nancy Krosse; Treasurer: Jean Dail; Day & Board Recording Secretary: Brenda Ziegler; Night Recording Secretary: Naomi te Wildt; Corresponding Secretary: Terry Caselton; Parliamentarian: Karen Anderson. After an

unanswered call for alternate candidates, Angi Merlone made a motion to approve, which was seconded by Cathy Stillman and approved by the members present. Barbara then awarded the Quilter of the Year Award to Michele Parry for her years of work on behalf of the guild.

**Challenge:** Sue McCollum was delighted that there were 37 entries for the Fall Challenge. She asked us to vote on our favorites with the main criteria being that the colors should match the paint chip attached to each quilt. Kay read a thank you note she received from that neighbor who lost her home. It was very touching. La Vern Newman told us there would be a quilt show in Los Altos Hills to raise funds for the quilt museum in Lincoln, Nebraska.





**Routed West: Twentieth-Century African American Quilts in California** -- through Nov. 30, 2025, at the University of California, Berkeley Art Museum & Pacific Film Archive (BAMPFA), 2155 Center St., Berkeley. The exhibit traces the flow and flourishing of quilts in the context of the Second Great Migration.
