
## Welcome: Miriam Kaplan and Pam McGraw

## Peninsula Quilters Board Meeting June 4, 2025

Attendees: Nancy Krosse, Carol Blitzer, Holly Colgan, Jean Dail, Wanda Lewis Dragon, Barbara Hall, Sandy Kelly, Barbara Mattson, Anne Merics, Angi Merlone, Michele Parry, Jena Walter and Cynthia Yin. Absent: Terry Caselton, Julie Curry and Harriet Hirsch The meeting was called to order at 10:02 a.m.

**President (Nancy Krosse)** requested approval of the April board meeting minutes; Cynthia Yin made a motion to approve, seconded by Sandy Kelly, minutes were approved; requested

approval of the May board meeting minutes, Carol Blitzer made a motion to approve, seconded by Jean Dail, minutes were approved.

After considerable discussion to approve an increase of membership dues, including the review of general membership survey results, several options were presented. The proposal to increase membership dues to \$75 for the next fiscal year was made by Cynthia Yin, seconded by Holly Colgan. Motion passed.

Fundraising (Sandy Kelly) – Auction plans and collections are going well.

**Fundraising (Angi Merlone)** – We are moving ahead with making a sports-themed quilt to raffle at the San Mateo County Fair next year. Angi is looking for SF Giants or Warriors T-shirt contributions as well as a committee chair to coordinate. Cynthia Yin volunteered to chair. Angi will help with the guilting and collection of the T-shirts.

Activities and Events (Holly Colgan) – New member bio's are going well, and we are almost up to date.

**Vice President (Barbara Mattson)** – Quilter of the Year nomination ballots are ready to be distributed at the next general meeting. She is working on the formation of a nomination committee after verification of open board positions.

**Treasurer (Jean Dail)** – gave an update on the budget including income and expense balances

**Membership (Cynthia Yin)** – membership is at 156 members. She thanked Michèle for all her assistance with the roster. Continuing to work on cost reduction, we will be moving to an online Google sheet roster with secure member access. Limited information will be in the roster such as a listing of: members, board members and business affiliates; all other information currently in the roster will be moved to the PQ website. The membership form will be updated to add permission for inclusion in the online roster.

Parliamentarian (Michèle Parry) - Michèle is looking for someone to take over as Parliamentarian. She is willing to mentor for one year to aid in the transition. She is also researching an alternative to iVolunteer as they are discontinuing their "legacy" program. No longer being a legacy member would result in increased cost for PQ. Alternative suggestions were: SignUpGenius. Cheddar Up, and Zeffv. Michèle will continue to research.

Virtual Retreat (Barb Hall) – another great retreat, will schedule again in the Fall.

**President (Nancy Krosse)** - will send a blast prior to the general meeting notifying membership of the Board decision to increase dues.

## PQ General Meeting Minutes June 18, 2025

**Nancy Krosse**, president, called the meeting to order at 7:06 p.m. The meeting was held at the San Mateo Garden Center and offered on Zoom.

Nancy welcomed all the members present, Zoomers and visitors.

She also reminded members to buy raffle tickets for the fabric baskets; as well as the last chance to buy tickets for the Opportunity Quilt.

Please remember to stand on the blue X on the floor so the Zoomers can see you.

The minutes for the May meeting were approved.

**Jean Dail**, treasurer, gave a report on the financial status of the guild. We broke even in May with revenue and expenses.

**Annual Dues:** Nancy stated that one of the main goals of her time as president has been to have a balanced budget. So far, we have accomplished the closing out of the storage locker, discontinuing the guilt shows, and finding new sources of revenue. The loss of PQIF was offset

by the revenue from the San Mateo Garden Center Open House and Craft Show. There has been discussion over the past few months regarding raising the membership dues. After reviewing the results of membership surveys, the board has decided to raise the dues to \$75 per year. This amount reflects the rate of inflation for the past 20 years that the dues have not been raised. A motion was raised and seconded. There was discussion among the members present regarding their concerns. Michele Parry, parliamentarian, and Jean Dail were able to answer the concerns raised. A vote was taken of the members present and those on Zoom; and the motion was passed. The raise will take affect with the September dues. Those that wish to make an additional donation can use the form on the website.

**Sandy Kelly** is still collecting items for the August auction. Please get your donations to Sandy by the end of July so she can catalog everything. The inventory will be posted on the website and will be a live and silent auction. Member of other guilds will be invited to attend.

Sandy brought kits for next month's workshop. They are on the side table and are \$12 for each kit. Be sure to sign the sheet if you buy a kit. You will need to bring your machine and supplies to the workshop.

There are three openings for next year's retreat at the Newman Ranch in Santa Rosa, April 6-9, 2026. Please let Sandy know if you are interested.

**Barbara Mattson, Quilter of the Year:** Barbara distributed ballots to nominate a member for Quilter of the Year. Please place your ballot in the blue box in the back of the room or return by e-mail to Barbara before July 7. She will tally the nominations and at the July meeting will distribute the ballots for the nominees. Members will vote then and the finalist will be announced at the September Birthday Party meeting.

**Jess Milikan** reminded everyone that the Free Table is this Saturday from 9-11:30 a.m. at her house.

**Leonie Batkin** reported that we made \$897 at the **San Mateo County Fair** selling raffle tickets for the opportunity quilt. She gave a big Thank You to all the members who volunteered. **Julie Curry, Outreach Program:** Julie asked the program coordinators to explain the programs

they coordinate. These donated quilts bring a ray of sunshine and comfort to those in need.

Linda Hester and Mary Raftery – baby quilts for Bundles of Joy, San Mateo County Hospital. They will wash the quilts before donation. Low-income mothers are given a gift of baby supplies along with a quilt.

Annette Caves – San Mateo Foster Youth Program, children in the foster care program are given a quilt they can keep when they are transitioning. Twin size quilts are preferred. Judy Miyake – LifeMoves provides temporary housing and assistance to people who are having difficulty and homeless in San Mateo County. They are given the quilts along with other necessities. Twin size quilts are preferred.

*Julie Curry*— Be Charitable meets on the second Friday at the Burlingame Community Center. We make the tops for donation quilts, between 120-130 tops a year. She is looking for a new coordinator for the fall.

A big Thank You to all the long-armers who help finish the quilt tops.

Barbara Hall had nothing to report.

Nancy (for **Angi Merlone**) relayed that they are looking for sports fabric and T-shirts (Warriors and/or Giants) for quilts for next year's San Mateo County Fair. Please give them to Angi or Cynthia Yin. Always Quilting is donating the fusible interfacing for the quilt.

**Sue McCollum, Fall Challenge:** There is no cost for the Paint Chip Challenge. Participants will receive an envelope with paint chips in it. You must use one or any of the colors on the paint chips in your quilt (you do not need to use all of the colors). You may add a solid of white, cream, gray or black, but only one. The quilt should be a minimum of 18" and maximum of 36". The deadline is Sept. 17. Please bring your quilt in early (9 a.m.) so it can be hung. There will not be any advance online viewing or voting.

**Announcements:** Theresa Koetters stated that the U. C. Berkeley Art Museum and Pacific Film Archive BAMPFA currently has an exhibit of 20<sup>th</sup> Century African American Quilts in California until Nov. 30.

Michael's has purchased the intellectual property of Joann's and their private label brands. Purchases can be made on line and it is expected that some of the stores may begin to carry fabric.

**Cynthia Yin, Membership**,: There are 58 members present, 11 on Zoom, 2 guests (Gary and Jenny), and one new member Wendy Hill. The membership raffle was drawn.

Cynthia discussed the upcoming on-line roster, which will be a Google spreadsheet. There will also be a printable spreadsheet available. The other pertinent information will be on the website including the Bylaws, Standing Rules and Affiliate information. This will eliminate the cost of printing the roster, saving about \$780 per year.

**Through Sept. 7, 2025: Kay Sekimachi: Ingenuity and Imagination --** Kay Sekimachi learned to make origami figures and to paint and draw while in an incarceration camp for Japanese Americans during World War II. She enrolled at the California College of Arts and Crafts in 1946, spent two summers at the Haystack Mountain School of Crafts in Maine, and by 1949 was weaving large, complex wall hangings. In the late 1970s, Sekimachi began to create small pots and bowls that combine Japanese paper with materials left over from her weaving.
